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EDUCATIONAL APPLICABILITY

The Last Crayon is an uplifting story about seeing the beauty and power of something that isn't obvious at first. Not every crayon can be the brightest, most colourful crayon in the packet. In the book, it takes a very special young squirrel to see the true potential of a crayon that has been rejected by others for being not colourful enough. There's a powerful message here, conveying the concept, 'appearances are often deceiving'. Key themes are diversity and inclusion.

DISCUSSION TOPICS

Read the book together, asking questions throughout.

- 1. Look at the cover of the book together. What do you think the story might be about?
- 2. Ask the children what their favourite colour is? Does anyone say grey?
- 3. Talk about the colours and what things match up with the colours can the children think of more examples?
- 4. Why does the grey squirrel struggle at first to think of things that are grey?
- 5. What does the grey squirrel think of at the end of the story?
- 6. Talk to the children about celebrating differences and inclusion.
- 7. Can you think of another title for the book?
- 8. What did the children think of the book? If they liked it, why did they like it? What was their favourite part?
